



Richard Isabelle is DAPNet's insurance agent representing Farm Family Insurance Company. In preparation for the Field Days I stopped in at his office to discuss presenters, food vendors, camping and all the various aspects of the event that are important from the insurance angle. I stopped in my tracks just inside the door – a huge section of the wall had become a canvas for local muralist, Tara Goreau. The 9' x 12' scene features several Newport landmarks: Lake Memphramagog and downtown buildings, but driving right into the room is a team of horses pulling a wagon past a farmer out standing in her field of vegetables. There are cows lying under a tree and a chicken crossing the road. Rick is driving the horses, apparently taking his family (including the dog!) for a wagon ride. Rick had seen Tara's work at Jasper Hill Cheese Cellar, Pete's Greens and other places and liked her style. "To me it's folk art," he says of her work, "it is realistic, true to Vermont and the area." He likes the way she captures many aspects of agriculture in one painting, and how she captured the local area with the lake and buildings of Newport.

Rick has a long history of working with farmers in his former career in finance. Two and a half years ago he left the finance world for insurance, choosing to work with Farm Family. He says he chose them because of their grassroots approach and their connection both to the ag community and the community at large.

Rick and Farm Family work with farmers of all description, from organic vegetable farms to dairy farms to horse, sheep & goat farms. He works with farms of every scale, from hobby to large commercial operations. I asked him what he likes best about working with farmers and he answered immediately: "The people – the bottom line is, it's all about the people." Proving his point, he tells me that he is out of the office making the rounds with his clients 3 days a week, crisscrossing his territory north of White River Junction in both Vermont and New Hampshire. He has been a great help to DAPNet, explaining our coverage options and going over the ins and outs of insurance minutia that can make my head spin, always patient and helpful. What is Farmhack?

Farmhack is an open source community for farm innovation. It is a farmer-driven project to develop, document and build tools for resilient agriculture. We engage both farmers and non-farmers with in-person events across the country, as well as a wiki-based online platform for tool documentation and sharing. The kind of equipment we need is affordable, adaptable, appropriate and easy to fix. Our goal is to speed the dissemination of great ideas, and increase feedback and improvements on all tools. Within the Farmhack framework are various spheres of activity: opensource biofuels processing, organic no-till, bike-powered hand-scale vegetable equipment, arduino sensors, environmental monitoring, mechanical hacks for tractor hitches, tractor-hacks for horse-power etc. These spheres and projects are driven by users: designers, farmers and others looking for feedback, support and team-mates. Some people are also

fabricating kits or doing small manufacturing runs of tools they sell. As long as the designs are open-source, Farmhack can be your marketplace as well as your toolbox.

Farmhack Glossary:

Open-source - is a phrase coming from the software development community to explain a " shared code" where programmers can use each other's work freely and creatively.

Wiki-based - A wiki is a way of ordering text and information in an open source way. The most famous example is wikipedia (a user generated, expert vetted online encyclopedia). Therefore a wiki is a way of compiling a collaborative 'article' or 'tool description' between many farmers-- who can all comment on and contribute to a tool that is documented.


Online platform - Just like the Grange is an "in person social platform," an online platform is a gathering place for conversations, brainstorms and digital documenting of CAD Designs and tools.

Arduino sensors - are tiny opensource computer chips that you can program to do simple actions, like turn off irrigation or turn on an electric fence. These can be programmed with a cell phone for remote access, or they can be linked to a thermometer or switch.

Hacks - A hack is any design that improves the functionality of a tool within a system, even if the tool wasn't originally designed with that function in mind. Hacks are fixes, tweaks, modifications many times with found or salvaged equipment that get the job done better, more efficiently and with little cost.

Location for Forestry Demos on Saturday Morning:

Two logging sessions on Saturday morning will take place at a local sugar bush located just one mile from the Fairgrounds. Hay wagons will take folks up to the wood lot. Anyone going to the woodlot should wear sturdy shoes and be comfortable moving around over rough or uneven ground. There will be a short walk (~100 yards) from the wagon drop spot to the demo area. Bring an extra layer & jacket if the weather is damp.

Directions: Leave the Fairgrounds and turn left on Roaring Brook Road. Turn right (south) on Rt 16. Go about 1 mile, turning in at Sugar Mill Farm on the right. Take the small road that goes out of the back of the parking lot (follow signs), cross the small covered bridge and park in the field in front of the sugar house.

Wagons leave sugar house at 8:20 and 8:25 Session 8:30 - 9:45 Wagons leave demo area at 9:50



Dave Clark – Works with a team or 3 halflingers. He uses his horses to hay, plow, give wagon rides and sleigh rides. Dave builds or refurbishes most of his equipment. He lives in Arglye, NY and loves to teach people how fun it is to work with draft horses.

Jenn Colby - .Jenn Colby is the Program Coordinator for the Pasture Program at the UVM Extension Center for Sustainable Agriculture. Jenn produces an annual grazing and livestock conference with the VT Grass Farmers and the VT Beef Producers, coordinates ongoing research and workshops, develops new projects, and provides technical assistance. She also operates a diversified meat livestock farm in Central Vermont and competes regionally as part of a barbecue team.

Bill Cole - "I have owned and worked with oxen my entire life. I have used them in the woods, on the farm, and traveling to many pulling competi-

tions around New England. I own Ox Hill Construction LLC which I specialize in agricultural buildings, ox related equipment and trimming/shoeing oxen."

Bob Copobianco - is a horse-logger and sugar-maker who lives in Washington, VT. He has been working horses in the woods and introducing beginners to the work since 1982.


Ben Dube - is a graduate of the sustainable agriculture program at Green Mountain College and has worked full time for the college farm for nearly two years. He learned to drive oxen while a student and now teaches and works with student teamsters as well as working oxen on the farm for haying and vegetable growing. He also conducts research on energy efficiency in farming, with a focus on animal traction and other ecologically based technologies.

David Fisher - has relied on work-

horses to power Natural Roots farm in Conway, MA since 2000. With his wife, Anna Maclay and their two children, he raises 3 1/2 acres of produce for 200 CSA shareholders, and another 3 1/2 acres of soil building crops. David has modeled many of the farm's systems on the work of Anne and Eric Nordell and is focused on weed control, biological fertility, and intensive cover cropping. He also manages about 15 acres of hay and pasture land to feed the working herd and uses his horses for low-impact logging in the winter months.

Karl Hammer – is the founder and owner of the Vermont Compost Company in Montpelier, VT. They offer quality organic compost blends for a variety of garden applications. Mammoth donkeys are his power source of choice, as he has worked with them for more than 20 years.

On top of managing all of the draft horse shoe orders. Keelev runs the Will Lent Horseshoe Company farrier supply business and tries to keep Will pointed in the right direction...not an easy job!
